President's Message

Awards season kicked off with the Spirit Awards in November, and will end with this year's controversial Academy Awards in February. In light of the growing criticism about the lack of diversity in nominees and

a boycott announcement by Jada Pinkett, Academy President Cheryl Boone Isaacs issued this statement:

"As many of you know, we have implemented changes to diversify our membership in the last four years. But the change is not coming as fast as we would like. We need to do more, and better and more quickly... This isn't unprecedented for the Academy. In the '60s and '70s it was about recruiting younger members to stay vital and relevant. In 2016, the mandate is inclusion in all of its facets: gender, race, ethnicity and sexual orientation. We recognize the very real concerns of our community, and I so appreciate all of you who have reached out to me in our effort to move forward together."

CONCUSSION star Will Smith, who joined his wife Jada in saying he would not attend this year's awards ceremony, responded to the Academy's announcement last week in a BBC interview, which was promptly followed up by an *Entertainment* article. "This is far beyond me. This has nothing to do with me. This has nothing to do with awards," Smith said. "Awards are a really frivolous reason for me to put my hand up and make a statement. For me, this is much more about the idea of diversity and inclusion."

For the second straight year, all 20 men and women nominated in the Academy's acting categories are white. Although it's impossible to map the Golden Globe or Academy Awards perfectly to the SAG Awards because of the difference in award categories, this year's SAG Awards provided a broader opportunity for actors of all ethnicities to both participate and be

recognized for outstanding performances. Focused on performance only, the SAG Awards also highlighted films snubbed in this year's Academy Award nominations.

Predictably, Leonardo di Caprio took home another leading actor trophy for THE REVENENT at the SAG Awards. However, Idris Elba won both for his supporting role in the Netflix film BEASTS OF NO NATION, and also garnered top honors for his work in the television show LUTHER. Leading lady Brie Larson stayed on top, adding "the Actor" award to her Golden Globes win for the feature film ROOM. Other wins included Viola Davis for ABC's HOW TO GET AWAY WITH MURDER, Uzo Aduba for ORANGE IS THE NEW BLACK, and Queen Latifah for her portrayal of blues singer Bessie Smith in HBO's BESSIE. It's important to note that the SAG Awards are decided by a vote of peers, rather than a select group within an institution. Along with more award opportunities in film and television categories, peer-voting may influence the more diverse nomination and award results.

The same night the SAG Awards were being held in Los Angeles, the Sundance Film Festival was busy awarding Nate Parker's slave-revolt film THE BIRTH OF A NATION both the grand jury prize for narrative film and audience prizes in Park City, Utah. Parker's award sweep gave a nod to diversity. The New York Times quoted his onstage remarks: "An issue film succeeds when it touches people. I've seen that people are open to change." And in that moment, the race for the 2017 Academy Awards began.

Film & TV Training Seminar (FTVTS) is a two-day workshop designed to provide practical training for an entry-level Production Assistant job in the film and television industry. Participants will gain valuable

knowledge and insight into the entertainment industry and will learn about on-set etiquette and protocol from seasoned filmmakers. The course will also include information on how to create a film- friendly resume, search for local VA productions and interview effectively.

Learn how to work on set or in the production office and become "the unforgettable PA." The training includes:

FTVTS is part of a workforce development initiative produced by the Virginia Film Office in association with the Virginia Production Alliance, and for this particular event, the Film and Video Studies at

George Mason University.

A Record-Breaking, Award-Winning, Viral-Watching Year for Double R

Double R Productions recently presented gold and silver Television, Internet & Video Association of DC Peer Awards to the National Association of Broadcasters for the NAB Congressional Public Service Announcement Campaign. We broke our 2013 campaign record in 2015 with 307 senators, representatives and their families recording a total of 566 spots. The NAB distributed the 30second PSAs to radio and TV member stations throughout the nation. Participants represent 49 states and three U.S. territories. Street Sense Rising Film Cooperative Screening

First a bit about Street Sense in their own words: We have been changing the story about homelessness in our community since 2003. We offer economic opportunities to people experiencing homelessness through media that elevates voices and encourages debate on poverty and injustice. Our innovative approach harnesses the talents, aspirations and hard work of men and women who are homeless. At Street Sense we define ourselves through our work, talents and character, not through our housing situation.

I am neither a filmmaker nor a scriptwriter yet I attended the Street Sense Rising screening of two-30 min. films screened at Miss Pixie's on Jan 8 were "Fairness Rising" by Reginald Black and Robert Warren and "Raise to Rise" by Sasha Williams. Discussion with filmmakers followed the screenings. The films were short and, not surprisingly, emotional but what really struck me was the awesome power of film to communicate and tell the loud and quiet stories of these lives. We have all read and seen so much about homelessness that the "real" simply becomes "unreal". Those "others" become a narrative or backdrop. Each of the films depicted stories about homelessness

and were directly told in the voice, face, pictures and actual sounds of an individual person's life.



The production cooperative they call CAPTURING HOPE enables and encourages the homeless in the Nation's Capital to share their stories through original cinematography from the viewpoint of the street. And the stories told are of real living people; a significant number of whom perish annually because of hypothermia. The three films showed what life is really like living in a shelter or on the street. And each of the filmmakers, who spoke after the screening, had

been in and out of homelessness themselves. Like the films, the messages were short, to the point and did have some uncomfortable moments but depicted a remarkable tenderness to the humanity of their struggles.

I attended because I already help run an all-volunteer, community, non-profit, which for the last 40 years has collected monetary donations, toiletries and warm coats for the homeless annually, but wanted to be re-educated about how powerful the tool of film, storytelling and advocacy can be when combined with the human spirit to keep moving forward and survive.
