

HIGH TIDE IN DORCHESTER Premiere - March 22

HIGH TIDE IN DORCHESTER aims to foster a conversation about climate change and related impacts of sea level rise and erosion, and leverage that conversation into action. The focus, Dorchester County, MD, is already experiencing the future that increasingly faces coastal areas worldwide. This low-lying county on the Eastern Shore of the Chesapeake Bay is the fourth largest of Maryland's 23 counties by land area, but it is destined to drop to the 14th largest by 2100 - or sooner - as waters rise and erosion worsens. Dorchester is the coal miner's canary; ground zero for the Chesapeake Region.

What Is a Hostile Workplace?

In the wake of recent high-profile sexual harassment claims, many employees (and employers) are asking: what constitutes a "hostile work environment"? Women in Film & Video of Washington, DC (WIFV) endeavors to provide our members with information and resources about legal issues of interest and import. Click here for some basic information regarding the law on employment discrimination and hostile work environments.

Women in Film-LA launched a **Sexual Harassment Help Line** - an integrated program to refer victims of harassment to designated mental health counselors, law enforcement professionals, and civil and criminal lawyers and litigators. Anyone, regardless of gender, can access the Sexual Harassment

Help Line at 323-545-0333. The help line is open Monday-Friday from 10 am-5 pm PST. After hours calls will be returned during business hours.

USA TODAY Releases Results of Harassment Survey

Thanks to WIFV Members who responded to the survey. Subsequent analyses are intended to look beyond Hollywood.



A USA TODAY survey of 843 women in the entertainment industry found 94% say they've experienced harassment or assault. Almost every one of hundreds of women questioned in an exclusive survey by USA TODAY said they have experienced some form of sexual harassment or assault during their careers in Hollywood, often by an older individual in a position of power over the accuser.

Working in partnership with the Creative Coalition, NYWIFT and the National Sexual Violence Resource Center, USA TODAY surveyed 843 women who work in the entertainment industry in a variety of roles (producers, actors,

writers, directors, editors and others) and asked them about their experiences with sexual misconduct.

In addition to the 94%, the study found that more than one-fifth of respondents (21%) said they have been forced to do something sexual at least once.


In a second installment, they'll bring a human face to the startling statistics revealed in their survey, with the tales of women who are struggling to unpack emotional baggage and deal with sorrow over derailed careers following sexual harassment. We'll also hear about the impact of micro-aggressions, commonplace behaviors which can be just as, if not more, damaging than other forms of harassment or assault.

In March: In a third installment, they examine how to fix a broken system. Mounting allegations in Hollywood have forced the top unions, trade groups and studios to re-examine their policies surrounding sexual harassment and assault. They catalog the actions taken by top institutions - including the Academy, Screen Actors Guild, and the big six movie studios - and assess what else needs to happen to effect change. Plus, we catalog what our survey respondents say they think needs to happen to create a safe working environment for women in Hollywood.

Decline in Female Protagonists in Top Grossing Films

Turns out WONDER WOMAN was an exception, not the new rule in Hollywood last year. A new study has found that the 100 top grossing films of 2017 saw even fewer female protagonists than the year before, making up just 24 percent, compared to 29 percent in 2016.

According to this year's *It's a Man's (Celluloid) World* report by the Center for the Study of Women in Television and Film at San Diego State University, this low figure may come as a shock to many, as women characters gained high visibility in films like BEAUTY AND THE BEAST, STAR WARS: THE LAST JEDI and WONDER WOMAN - the three top grossing films of 2017. **Full report here**



"In an awards season when talk about women and gender has been top of mind, we need to separate hyperbole from reality," Martha Lauzen, executive director of the center, said in a statement. "The numbers do not yet reflect claims of a tectonic or massive shift in the film industry."
