### WIFV is pleased to announce the 2012 Women of Vision Award Recipients



Photo: Chad Evans Wyatt **Shirin Ghareeb** is Deputy Director of the Washington, DC International Film Festival (Filmfest DC), where she has served since 1990. She is also Founder and Director of the Arabian Sights Film Festival and is an acknowledged international expert on films from the Arab world. Filmfest DC is Washington's oldest and largest film festival and Mrs. Ghareeb is a leader in curating its film program and coordinating its administrative activities. Now in its 17th year, the Arabian Sights Film Festival has grown to become a much anticipated and well-received event.

Mrs. Ghareeb has served as a consulting expert for the Library of Congress helping to select features for its archive on Arab and North African cinema. She has assisted in coordinating a film series on Afghanistan at the National Gallery of Art and recently concluded a research project on tolerance in Arab cinema for a national think tank. Her expertise and advocacy in this regard have helped give voice to an often under represented filmmaking community

and have resulted in increased mutual cultural understanding.

Best recognized for her highly politicized contributions to Polish New Wave cinema, **Agnieszka Holland** ranks as one of Poland's pre-eminent filmmakers. Her first feature film, *Provincial Actors* (1978), was one of the flagship pictures of the "cinema of moral disquiet" and the winner of the International Critics Prize at the Cannes Film Festival in 1980.

Angry Harvest (1985), was Holland's breakthrough film on the international scene. She then she has earned international acclaim and a score of awards, including a Golden Globe and a



Best Adapted Screenplay Oscar nomination for *Europa, Europa* (1991). Her version of *The Secret Garden* (1993) -one of the director's Hollywood studio productions - was well received as was her adaptation of *Washington Square* (1997). Her most recent films are *Copying Beethoven* (2006) and *In Darkness* (2011), a Best Foreign Language Film Oscar nominee in 2012. Holland has a substantial career directing episodic television including *Ekipa, The Wire, Cold Case, Treme* and *The Killing*. Holland's direction of the *Treme* pilot in 2010 received an Emmy nomination.

**Margaret "Peggy" Parsons** is head of the department of film programs at the National Gallery of Art. Every weekend, she brings visitors to the Gallery to see newly-restored films, new works, and special guests in celebration of the art of the moving image. Since 1978 Parsons has been responsible for overseeing a collection of art films and videos, producing brochures and program notes, and introducing public film programs. Parsons heads an advisory committee of internationally recognized film scholars that meets annually to review and recommend film exhibition topics for the National Gallery of Art (NGA).

In addition to her role at the NGA, Parsons has held positions at the Smithsonian Institution, The National Trust for Historic Preservation, The Metropolitan Museum of Art, and The Children's Museum, Boston. Parsons has served as an advisor, panelist, programmer, or board member for arts

organizations, film festivals, and grant-making organizations. She has been a speaker for programs aired on NPR, VOA, BBC, Georgian Television/Radio, National Iranian Television, and MPT. Her articles and columns have appeared in *New York Folklore; Curator, Folklore Society of Greater Washington;* and *Folk Art Magazine*. Parsons also has served as editor and project supervisor for *The Art of Moving Shadows,* a catalogue that accompanied the film series *Photography and the Moving Image* and the 1989 exhibition *On the Art of Fixing a Shadow.* 

As Vice President of Production for Specials at Discovery Channel, **Christine Weber** ensures the quality and entertainment value of the events and landmark specials that are emblematic of the network brand. In addition, Weber manages the creative partnership with BBC for all of Discovery Communications. Under her oversight, the unit has coproduced numerous highly acclaimed series and singles including *LIFE*, *Human Planet*, *Frozen Planet*, *Dino Revolution* and *Finding Amelia*. She joined Discovery Communications in 2007.

Prior to working at Discovery, Weber launched TTP for Tigress Productions and Tiger Aspect - two of Britain's leading independent producers - to secure commissions from US broadcasters for UK production. In just five years, she turned a one-woman office into a multimillion dollar production company. At the start of her production career,



Weber was at National Geographic where she ultimately built an internal production unit which delivered the first 100 hours of programming for the newly launched National Geographic Channels

and created a partnership with WNET resulting in multiple specials for *NATURE*. Weber's work as a Director/Producer spans a wide range of subjects including natural history, human history, science, and adventure. Her films garnered eight Emmy nominations and four Emmy Awards including best documentary in their category for *Search for Battleship Bismarck* and *U-Boat: Terror on our Shores*.
