Australia

Note: Saara Lamberg was born in Finland and now lives in Australia, where she is a director, actor, writer, and producer. Her first feature film INNUENDO was released in October. She wrote, directed and produced the film in which she also plays the lead.



Finland is very socialist and in many ways the most equal country I have lived in, but when it comes to arts, it is still very backwards there. Unless you are born into an artist family, it's very difficult to make inroads. I wasn't getting anywhere in Finland. I didn't even get to study what I wanted, so I headed overseas, first to England and then Australia.

I have received some great support from America, and I don't even live there (yet). Australia has been good as well, although I know in these places, statistically it might be even harder for a woman to make it in the film industry. For myself, gender is not important in any area of my life. It's all about respect and being authentic to yourself as a person, and that is what I try and strive

towards. I have collected some fabulous men and women around me to help me deliver the vision that I have for my films.

My background is in acting, and I believe that gives me a great understanding of good performance. For me, believable performance is what makes the film. Anyone who went to film school can deliver a good-looking piece of screen media, but it takes more artistry to create a film. I pride myself in making the right casting choices and then being able to direct those actors to deliver the best performances possible. The acting style that I like is very understated, even bland, and perhaps that reflects my Finnish upbringing. Emotions there are really fine-tuned and subtle, humor is dark, dry, and intelligent. For me, less is always more.

Broadening Access to Black Public Media. WOKE! will connect storytellers of color working in nonfiction and emerging media to funding, training, resources, partners and distribution opportunities. One of such programs will be the implementation of a Black Media Summit, featuring filmmakers, distributors, philanthropists and funders to tackle the most pressing issues of the black community and get these stories told most effectively.


