JOHN LEWIS: GOOD TROUBLE Available July 3

JOHN LEWIS: GOOD TROUBLE, directed by acclaimed filmmaker Dawn Porter (TRAPPED, GIDEON'S ARMY), chronicles the life and career of the legendary civil rights activist and Democratic Representative from Georgia. Using interviews and rare archival footage, JOHN LEWIS: GOOD TROUBLE chronicles John Robert Lewis' 60-plus years of social activism and legislative action on civil rights, voting rights, gun control, health-care reform and immigration. Using present-day interviews with Lewis, now 80 years old, Porter explores his childhood experiences, his inspiring family and his fateful meeting with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in 1957. In addition to her interviews with Lewis and his family, Porter's primarily cinéma verité film also includes interviews with political leaders, Congressional colleagues, and other people who figure prominently in his life. Coming to You - Starting in August!



We are so eager to bring filmmaking resources to this community that we aren't waiting for the return to "normal." And really, how good was "normal" for you anyway? ScriptDC has always been about taking the field for this region's filmmakers by bringing information, resources, and connections that you can use to tell your stories.

So, we're deconstructing the weekend event into a series of 20+ workshops that will be presented across six months or so. Each month will have a a theme and the workshops - set aside those Tuesday evenings now - will feature subject-matter experts who are interested in nurturing your talent.

August 11 will be a session with **Dave Trottier** (Yes, the author of *The Screenwriter's Bible* and several other screenwriters' reference books) to explain formatting for screenplays. **August 18** will be a demonstration of **Final Draft 11** when Shelly Mellott and Andrew Schwartz will reveal the latest features and best tips for maximizing this industry-standard software. Registration for these programs will open in early July. There will be significant time for questions (and answers) in both sessions.

September will focus on the foundations of screenwriting - plot, character, feedback. Other themes covered in October, November, January, and February will include Writing for Episodic Television, Documentaries, Writing Features, Producing, and It's On You! We are finalizing the presenters across these themes.
