
Ann Hornaday - Conversation with a Critic

Women's Filmmakers Festival at SAAM, March 7



The main event will be in SAAM's McEvoy Auditorium (8th & F Streets NW) on Saturday March 7, from 2-7 pm. The day offers rich goodies for those interested in art, film, feminism and their overlaps, as well as those who enjoy free events and fascinating conversations.

On Saturday, the 2:00 pm screening features experimental art videos by internationally acclaimed artists Wangechi Mutu, Meriem Bennani, Jen Liu and Carey Young... and all but Mutu will be joining for a post-screening Q&A.

4:30 pm screening of the indie classic *BORN IN FLAMES* (R, 1983) followed by Saisha Grayson, curator of time-based media at the Smithsonian American Art Museum, in conversation with director Lizzie Borden. The film chronicles an intersectional feminist rebellion that emerges a decade into a dystopian social democratic revolution... and if that's not a hook, the film steeped in NYC's 80s downtown scene, and cameos by Katheryn Bigelow, Flo Kennedy, and Eric Bogosian and punk bands of the era really make this a rare time capsule. The film examines issues of race, class, and sexism in ways that remain provocative and resonant today; can't wait to hear Borden's thoughts on where we are now!



Presented by the 2020 One Woman One Vote Festival in collaboration with the John F. Kennedy Center for the **DIRECT CURRENT** festival and in cooperation with the National Museum of Women in the Arts.

13th explores the 13th Amendment, which abolished slavery with one important caveat: a person can legally be enslaved if they commit a crime. Through gripping testimony and archival footage, *13th* argues that slavery has not completely disappeared - it's been redesigned, repackaged, and resold as the criminal justice system.

At this Concert Hall event, Artistic Director for Jazz Jason Moran and his band perform Moran's powerful score along with the film for the very first time. Following the screening and performance, stay for a discussion with DuVernay. Part of **DIRECT CURRENT**, the Kennedy Center's celebration of contemporary culture and in cooperation with the National Museum of Women in the Arts.



This screening is presented in collaboration with the One Woman, One Vote 2020 Festival, a citywide celebration featuring films, concerts, and exhibitions to mark the centennial of the 19th

Amendment. presented in partnership with the District of Columbia's Office of Cable, Television, Film, Music, Entertainment (OCTFME). The free events feature additional films, documentaries, television, and titles released by Array, DuVernay's film distribution and resource collective.



The Environmental Film Festival in the Nation's Capital is the world's premier showcase of environmentally themed films. Since 1993 our mission has been to celebrate Earth and inspire understanding and stewardship of the environment through the power of film.

Each March in Washington D.C., we present 100+ films to audiences throughout the city. Filmmaker and topical discussions are an important part of our events which happen at museums, embassies, libraries, universities and local theaters throughout the city. We also present a year-round screening series and community events.

Many of our screenings are free, and our Washington, D.C. location offers the unique opportunity for films and filmmakers to reach national and international lawmakers and decision-makers. Our impact continues to grow both in DC and beyond.

We are the largest green film festival in the world; the longest-running in the United States. In 2019, DCEFF was

Resources to Report Harassment 885-943-5463

A Centers for Disease Control national survey found that over 18% of women reported having been raped in their lifetime. Yet, most go unreported - for a variety of reasons. This week's ruling in the Harvey Weinstein New York trial has proven that women's voices are not only being heard but deserve to be recognized for the courage it takes to speak up. The women that came forward regardless of their own personal or professional detriment deserve to be commended - as well as all who rallied around them to protect and support.

We wanted to take this opportunity to assure you that you are not alone if you find yourself in a difficult work situation. WIFV partners with Women in Film Los Angeles to expand the Mid-Atlantic resources at the Women in Film Help Line. Trauma-informed staff responders take calls from across the country. WIFV is working with WIF-LA to provide an integrated program of resources and support-including referrals to pro bono legal services, sliding-scale therapy, and free support groups-for anyone who has experienced sexual harassment or misconduct.
