### Fleming Documented DC Checkers Club

Several years ago, **Peggy Fleming** documented the DC Checkers Club and its members located. The Club, located for years in the Shaw neighborhood, was



recently asked to vacate the space and it may be the end of the club. We are so glad Peggy is sharing the film with you in this newsletter! Here's a recent article from the Post.

### **Hechinger Report & Sanchez's REMOTELY LEARNING**

REMOTELY LEARNING from director **Jody Hassett Sanchez** offers an intimate look at family dynamics and the extraordinary demands placed on mothers during the pandemic. Filmed almost entirely on mobile phones by three moms in Texas, North Carolina and Massachusetts, the film captures who succeeds and who doesn't when families "do school" from home for a year. The film is being released by *The* 



Hechinger Report, a national nonprofit newsroom that reports on one topic: education. You can read the article and see REMOTELY LEARNING here.

Jody decided to make the 16 minute documentary last March, when the headlines were focused on the looming health crisis. As the mother of an 11-year-old boy and a former ABC education producer, she says she could almost predict what was coming if schools didn't re-open after spring break. She found three terrific moms willing to share their lives during this stressful time. One sends her kids to a charter school, another's is in public school and the third homeschools her nine children. The film captures the stress, frustration, boredom and occasional bright spots of their past year. She just finished filming in early March 2021.

Filmmaking in the time of COVID prompted Jody to consider new ways to be inclusive and creative in her filmmaking. She says that when she asked Thalia, a Haitian immigrant entrepreneur, Francine, who is living below the poverty line and Alyssa, an Orthodox Christian, to make this film with her, "It was a much bigger request than asking them to trust me to convey their stories truthfully. I was asking them to be my co-collaborators, to film their daily lives and bring their POV to the film. I gave them all filming lessons via zoom and by early summer, they were all shooting like pros!" All three are all credited in the film and will be listed as DP's on IMDB. Jody shared her tips on filming with phones in a blog for WIFV that you can read here.

## George A. Romero's Lost TV Pilot Resurrected

A TV pilot created by the legendary filmmaker **George A. Romero** (1940-2017) is finally receiving distribution nearly 22 years after the project first wrapped production. On April 3, 2021, **Cryptic Pictures Distribution**, in association with Image 987, will be releasing IRON CITY ASSKICKERS (1998) on DVD and vintage VHS. Directed by George A. Romero and filmed in his trademark unapologetic style, the pilot centered on the untamed and unregulated amateur wrestling circuit of the late 1990s. Created long before the attitude era of professional wrestling embraced the moniker 'sports entertainment', and filmed nearly 15 years after the airing of John Stossel's 20/20 TV special which debated the profession's authenticity, this male soap opera explores the sensationalism behind the business and foreshadows the television genre now referred to as Reality TV.

The pilot will find its final home in the **Cryptic Pictures** company archives, now housed at the **University of Pittsburgh Library System's Horror Studies Collection**. **Cryptic Pictures LLC** is a U.S.-based, award winning film production company.

# **Annapolis Film Festival, April 8-18**



This year's festival has expanded to 10 days for its virtual presentation to allow for a better user experience this year," says Lee Anderson, Festival Director and Co-founder. "And because of that we have been able to program more films this year."

This year's program contains over 100 films (23 feature-length narrative films; 16 feature-length documentaries; 66 short films). The films come from 35 countries: Australia, Austria, Belgium, Bhutan, Brazil, Canada, Cuba, Czech Rep., Denmark, Egypt, Finland, France, Germany, Ghana, India, Iran, Israel, Italy, Kazakhstan, Latvia, Lebanon, Macedonia, Malta, Mauritania, Nigeria, Norway, Palestine, Romania, Saudi Arabia, South Korea, Spain, Taiwan, Turkey, UK, and USA. **Get passes here** 

"This year's opening night film MARVELOUS AND THE BLACK HOLE brings a bit of magic to our program (literally)," says Patti White, Festival Director and Co-founder. With heart and humor, it tells the story of a rebellious teenage girl (played by Miya Cech from the current TV show THE ASTRONAUTS) dealing with the loss of her mother and then bonding with an eccentric magician ("Marvelous Margot" played by Rhea Perlman, the Emmy-winning actress from the classic TV show CHEERS) who helps her to reconnect with life and joy. It's a story of being lost and found.

The Ninth Annual DC Web Fest aims to immerse its guests in a 2-bit, video-game style virtual world while promoting the best in independently-produced digital media. With the theme "See Problems as Possibilities" and set for April 9<sup>th</sup> and  $10^{th}$ , the virtual event will showcase the best of independent digital media as well as meaningful discussions with top experts in the industry.

These opportunities are available to WIFV members only.

- 1) The **Past Presidents' Mid-Career Development Scholarship\***, funded by past WIFV Presidents, enables creatives with a vision for their career paths and a need for additional focus and study in a particular field of interest to continue their professional development with a course at the Maine Media Workshops. Applicants must have at least 12 years experience as a media professional. **The deadline for the 2021 applications is April 19**. **More info here. The required application cover sheet is here.**
- 2) The WIFV Board of Directors is pleased to offer a **fiscal sponsorship** program to support the film and media projects of its members. It is one way WIFV strives to support the Mid-Atlantic filmmaking community. The WIFV Fiscal Sponsorship Program is a financial and legal system where our 501(c)(3) nonprofit status allows us to provide limited financial and legal oversight for a project initiated independently by a filmmaker. That project must be non-commercial in nature, i.e. not produced solely for financial gain Sponsored Projects are eligible to solicit and receive grants and tax-deductible contributions. **The Spring deadline for applications is April 26, 2021**. **More info and application instructions here**.
- 3) There is one call for **Seed Fund for Documentary Filmmakers** applications per calendar year. **The 2021 application deadline is May 17**. The application form is

THE WOMEN is a 1939 American comedy-drama film directed by George Cukor. The film is based on Clare Boothe Luce's 1936 play of the same name, and was adapted for the screen by Anita Loos and Jane Murfin. The film continued the play's all-female tradition—the entire cast of more than 130 speaking roles was female. The film stars Norma Shearer, Joan Crawford, Rosalind Russell, Paulette Goddard, Joan Fontaine, Lucile Watson, Mary Boland, Florence Nash, and Virginia Grey. Marjorie Main and Phyllis Povah also appear, reprising their stage roles from the play. Ruth Hussey, Virginia Weidler, Butterfly McQueen, and Hedda Hopper also appear in smaller roles. Set in the glamorous Manhattan apartments of high society, and in Reno, Nevada, where they obtain their divorces, it presents an acidic commentary on the pampered lives and power struggles of various rich, bored wives and other women they come into contact with. Throughout the film, not a single male character is seen or heard.
