Final Call for Applications: Short Narrative Finishing Grant

Administered by WIFV, this program exists to support WIFV Members with the post-production of a short film (no longer than 15 minutes including credits). It consists of limited in-kind services from Henninger Media Services, Interface Media Group, Ott House Audio, and ReelPlan. The application deadline for 2025 is



August 14, 2025 at 6:00 pm. There is a \$50 application fee. You will receive application submission instructions in your payment confirmation. **Read about the process here**.

This grant program was initiated with proceeds from the 2001 DC screening of WHAT MATTERS MOST, written and directed by Jane Cusumano. The first film to receive this grant was the award-winning TELL ME ABOUT ORANGE. It has been accepted into several film festivals and is now an award-winning short! It was one of six short films featured on The Wrap website during the Power Women's Summit on December 7 – 9, 2021. The WIFV Short Narrative Film Finishing Grant has also supported THE FAMILIAR, FLIGHT OF THE CROWS, and EXCUSE ME. These films are currently on the festival circuit!



Franceschi Gathering Stories and MPT Broadcast 7/26

WIFV member **Cheryle Franceschi** of Por Eco Productions, One Idea/Dos Languages has been sharing some of the watershed moments and first-of-its-kind initiatives of Fred W. Besley, Maryland's first State Forester in her indie doc MR. BESLEY'S FOREST. All of her films are available for streaming on the PBS app, with two being offered by NETA for national distribution to PBS stations.

Mr. Besley devised the mathematical formula for the study of measuring big trees. Today, the historic national program is administered by The University of Tennessee School of Natural Resources. The Director of the National Champion Tree Program is Jaq Payne. During the recent 9th American Forest Congress held in Washington, DC, both Payne and Franceschi (pictured above) thought the Congress was the ideal gathering to plant the seed for growing a new Concurrent Dialogue session entitled, "Impact Films for the Forests." The proposal was accepted! Conference participants gathered at the Omni Shoreham Hotel to explore the question of "who tells the stories" via long-form media.

Stories about communities, shared landscapes, food sheds, and forestry stewardship are part of Franceschi's environmental, and as she says, AGRI-cultural films. In 2024, she finished production that captured the work of a group of six extraordinary women from Maryland, preserving and sustaining food sources and applying best agricultural practices.

FOOD, FIBER & THE FEMALE FARMER is airing on Saturday, July 26th on Maryland Public Television at 7pm.

OLIVE Heads to Hollyshorts

Academy Award and 5x Golden Globe nominee Lesley Ann Warren stars in OLIVE, a 13-minute psychological drama written and directed by French filmmaker Tom Koch and produced by WIFV member **Astrid Lark**. The

film follows a man with dementia who believes his wife is his grandmother. Through dreamy visuals and shifting perspectives, OLIVE explores how cognitive distortions reshape love and identity.

The film was recently selected for the Oscar-qualifying Hollyshorts Film Festival, where it will screen at the TCL Chinese Theater on Sunday, August 10. Any WIFV members in Los Angeles are invited to attend!



OLIVE was awarded the Silver Screen award at the Young Director Award (YDA) in Cannes and is supported by the Alzheimer's Association and Oscar-winning executive producer Andrew Carlberg. The team is currently raising funds for festival submissions and travel. On August 3rd, Episode #104 - Chaz Ebert: Moving Forward After Roger, a New Book, & More

In this episode, host **Sandra Abrams** sits down with **Chaz Ebert**, for a lively discussion about her book, *IT'S TIME TO GIVE a FECK*. FECK stands for forgiveness, empathy, compassion and kindness. She also shares insights into the many projects she is working on including a documentary, WELLNESS WARRIOR, about the life of 102-year old Deborah Szekley, founder of the Rancho La Puerta spa. In addition to directing and writing, Ms. Ebert is the CEO of Ebert Digital LLC and is the legal adviser and TV and movie producer at Ebert Productions. For 24 years, she shared a life with Pulitzer-prize winner and film critic, Roger Ebert, who passed away in 2013. 

How RATIFIED Raised \$115K+ From Fundraising Screenings and Built a Movement in the Process

In the summer of 2024, Emily Best launched a **Seed&Spark campaign**, that included a surprisingly goofy pitch video with two very charming actors (her children). The campaign aimed to raise finishing and distribution funds for Ratified, a documentary Emily produced about the 101-year struggle to add the Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. She and the Ratified team, after eight years of working on this story, were tracking toward an August festival premiere but the moment was calling for more.

"We were at a really interesting point with this documentary, which is that we were not finished editing it, and the history was happening under our feet," Emily recalls. "Our activists were like, 'We need this film right now. How quickly can we start the process of actually getting it into the world?" Read the full article here!


