### WIFV Mems at Nepal America Int'l Film Festival

WIFV member and co-host of MediaMaker Spotlight, **Sandra Abrams**, attended the 2025 Nepal American International Film Festival opening night on June 26 at the iconic AFI Silver Theatre and Cultural Center. Kicking off the three-day event was the film, SHAMBHALA, by Nepalese writer and director, Min Bahadur Bham. Abrams found the film mesmerizing. It was Nepal's official submission to the 97th Academy Awards and was filmed entirely on



location in Tibet. It tells the story of Pema, a pregnant woman who sets out on a treacherous journey to find her husband, who disappeared while on a trading trip. The evening started with a ceremonial candle lighting by Nepalese comedian and film actor, Hari Banisha Acharya. He is one of the stars of THE WORLD'S HAPPIEST MAN, which made its US premiere during the festival. Abrams also had a chance to chat with Kirtana Banskota, one of the co-producers of that film and a co-founder of the festival. Overall, 30 films were presented from 14 countries during the festival. ## **Hurt's Team Wraps Short**

The short film, SEE IT, BE IT, is the final installment of *The Route Series*. It wrapped production back in April 2025. *The Route* is a three-part short film series that looks at Black women who made history in the media industry. The beauty of this project is that all of the featured women are alive and well. SEE IT, BE IT shares the story of Yvette Lee Bowser and how she became the

first Black women to have her own primetime series on network television. The short codirected by **Dr. Carletta S. Hurt** (WIFV Member, Past Board President) and Cameron Gray (past ImageMakers Participant) was filmed at Bard Early College High School. The screenplay was written by Tiffany Alexander and Cameron Gray. The film is currently in post-production with an anticipated release date of August 22.

Hurt is also excited to receive a grant from DC Humanities in the Community Culture and Heritage category. Announced in May, production for the short film on Brumsic Brandon, Jr starts in July 2025. In addition to support from DC Humanities, Hurt was awarded the DC Camera Film Equipment grant for the same project. Thanks to WIFV and DC Camera! The project, BRUMSIC BRANDON, JR.: A Legacy in Art and Activism, was crafted after working with his daughter, Barbara Brandon Croft, on *The Route Series* about her titled, *Art Imitates Life*. The anticipated release date for the documentary is April 2026 in time for what would have been his 99th birthday!

### Zabrieski Film Streaming

Tara Roberts Zabrieski's latest documentary film is now free to stream online and on the PBS app. "The Buzz on Native Plants" shows how a few small acts of planting with native plants can make a huge difference in flooding, erosion, drought, and wildlife habitat.

"I started the planning process for this film back in 2022. In the Winter/Spring of 2023 I applied for and received a grant from the Maine Outdoor Heritage Fund. I partnered with some organizations in Maine to bring this film to life, they helped me find the stories and ensured the accuracy of the content. As far as the production and post production goes I worked alone. I travelled to Maine in my old Dodge van with my Sony NX100 to film Maine's native plants, the pollinators who rely on them, and to show the beauty and function of planting with native plant species. During the fall and winter I edited the film between other freelance projects I had going on. It seemed to take forever, but there is no better feeling than showing your film to a room full of people for the first time. For me, this was at the Maryland International Film Festival in spring of 2024. Last summer I drove back to Maine to screen it at the Maine Outdoor Film Festival. The greatest compliment I got was from one of the people who I filmed and I was nervous about how they would react to seeing themselves on the big screen. During the Q&A she raised her hand and said "I've seen a lot of films on this and similar topics around climate change, and you really nailed it." Phew! I could finally relax."

This full film is 52 minutes to fit within the standard broadcast times for PBS stations. I also created short clips from the film to be used in classrooms or other educational settings. I've made screening licenses available on my website and I'm working with a curriculum developer to create something for middle and high school classrooms.

I love this work and I hope to continue to find ways to fund and distribute content about nature and science. Watch THE BUZZ ON NATIVE PLANTS Online Here. See more of Tara's work here.
